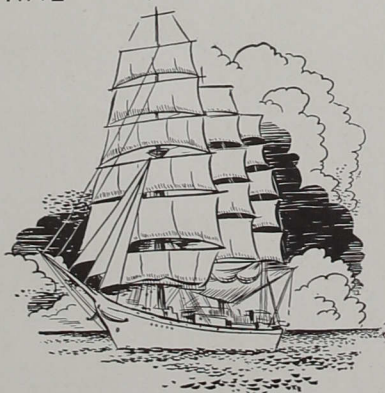

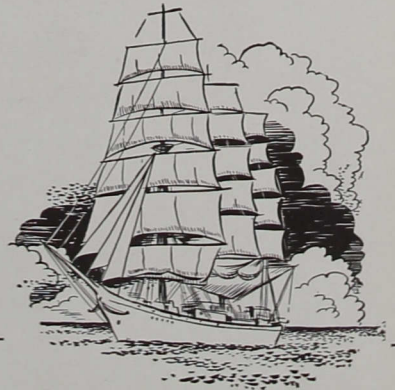

And quiet sleep and a sweet dream when the long trick's over.

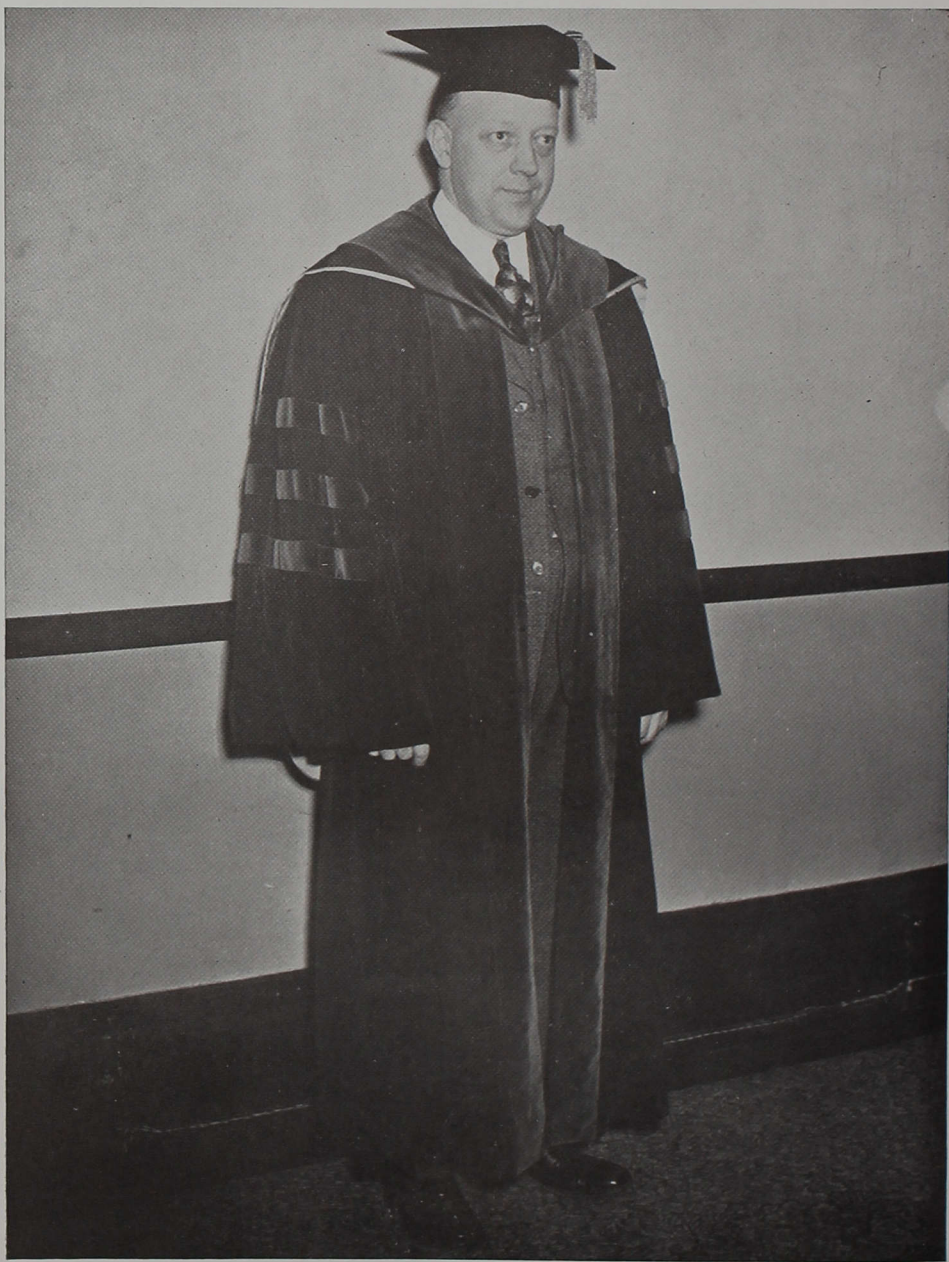

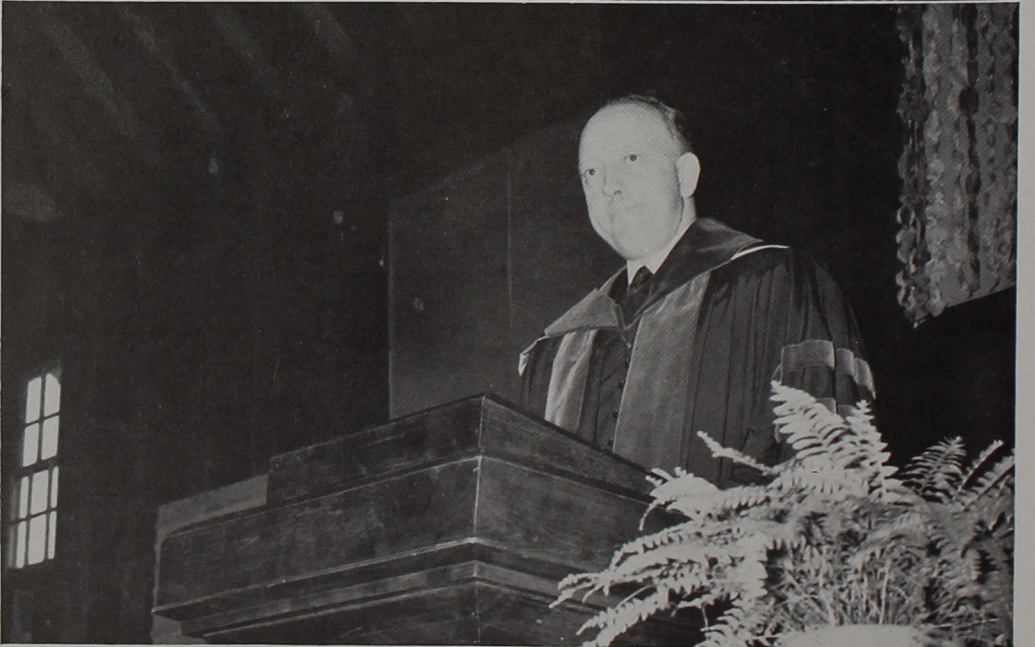
Our President

I. Lynd Esch was born in Flinton, Pennsylvania, November 17, 1905. In May, 1917, he graduated from grammar school, and in June, 1921, from Beccaria Joint High School, Coalport, Pennsylvania. During the following two years he worked at home on the farm and studied Pennsylvania law in the evenings intending to become a lawyer. From March to October of 1923 he worked in the office of the B. F. Goodrich Company, Akron, Ohio, and from October until April of the next year he worked as part owner of an automobile repair shop and attended law and accounting classes at Akron University Night School. From August of 1924 to August of 1933 President Esch was employed by the Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company. During this period he took the three-year course in business administration offered in the Production Flying Squadron and in 1927 became a professor in Goodyear Industrial University.

President Esch became pastor of the Oakland United Brethren church in August, 1933. He had completed his Conference Study Course for Ordination

while yet in East Ohio Conference and during the time he was teaching in the University and acting as Director of Christian Education in the Akron First Church. He was ordained in Sacramento, California, in August, 1933. He remained in Oakland until August, 1936, when he became pastor of the First United Brethren Church, San Diego. He took the pastorate of the Los Angeles First United Brethren Church in August, 1938, and remained there until 1945, when he became president of Indiana Central College.

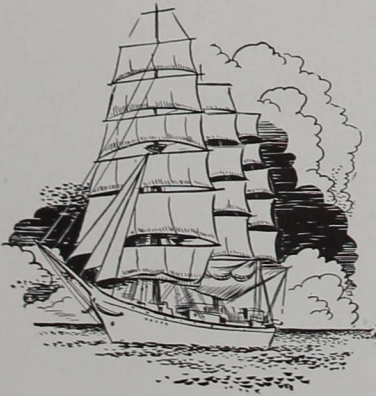
President Esch attended Williams College, Berkeley, California, a junior college, and received his A.B. degree from Chapman College, Los Angeles, Calif., in 1940. He received his Th. M. degree from the University of Southern California Graduate School of Religion with a major in religious education and in June, 1942, his Ph. D. degree from the University of Southern California Graduate School, continuing his major in religious education and taking a minor in sociology.



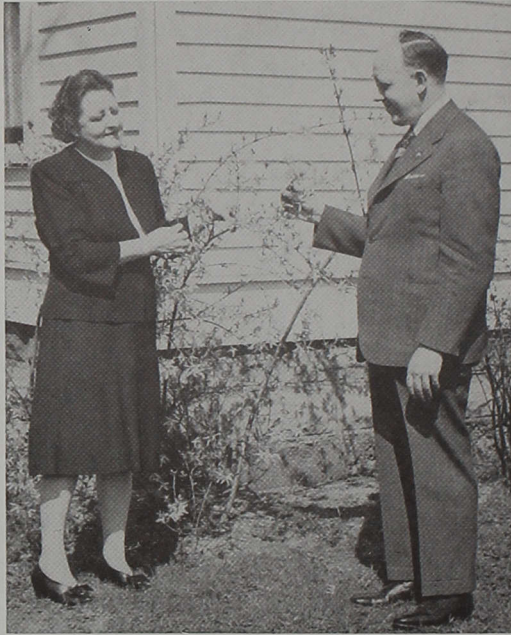

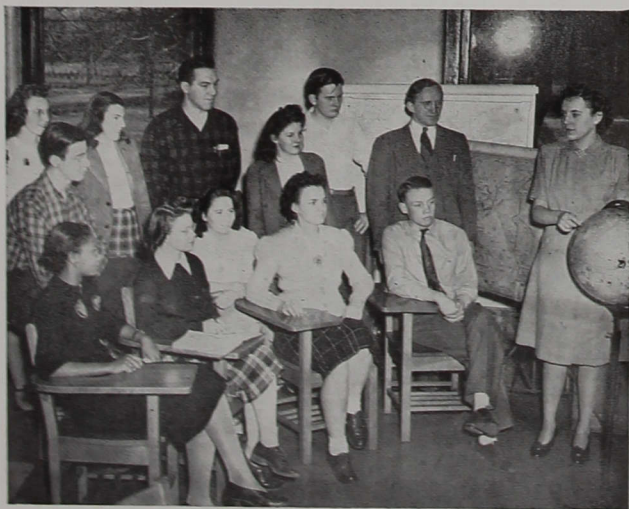

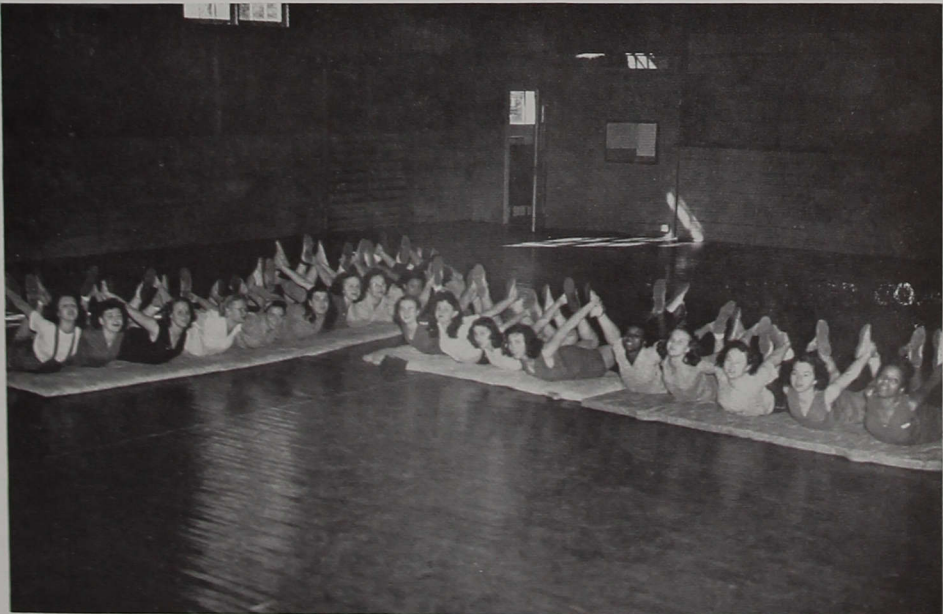


"Let's hear you make some noise"

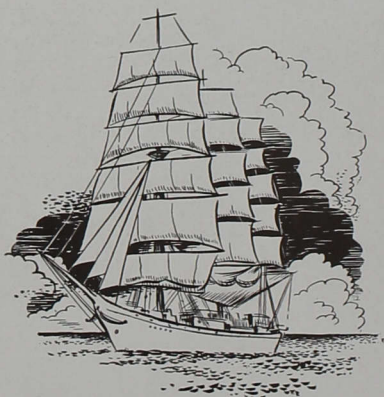
