The first basketball season perfection record in the history of the college was achieved by the 1941-42 Greyhound squad. Coach Good's boys suffered their last defeat December 16, 1940 with a 32-22 loss to LS.N.U. but finished that season (10 games) and the 1941-42 season (16 games) with no losses for a 26 consecutive game victory record.

The Central squad turned in double victories over Ball State, Manchester, I.S. N.U., Central Normal, Hanover, Oakland City, and Anderson; and single victories over Illinois Wesleyan and James Millikin.

During the season the Greyhounds averaged 57 points per game while their opponents averaged nearly 33. One interesting thing to note was that the Greyhounds led in every half-time score of the season. Bloomingdale, Crowe, Nicoson, and Howe all scored approximately the same number of points during the season.

JOHN FREDENBERGER










STUNTS AND TUMBLING


