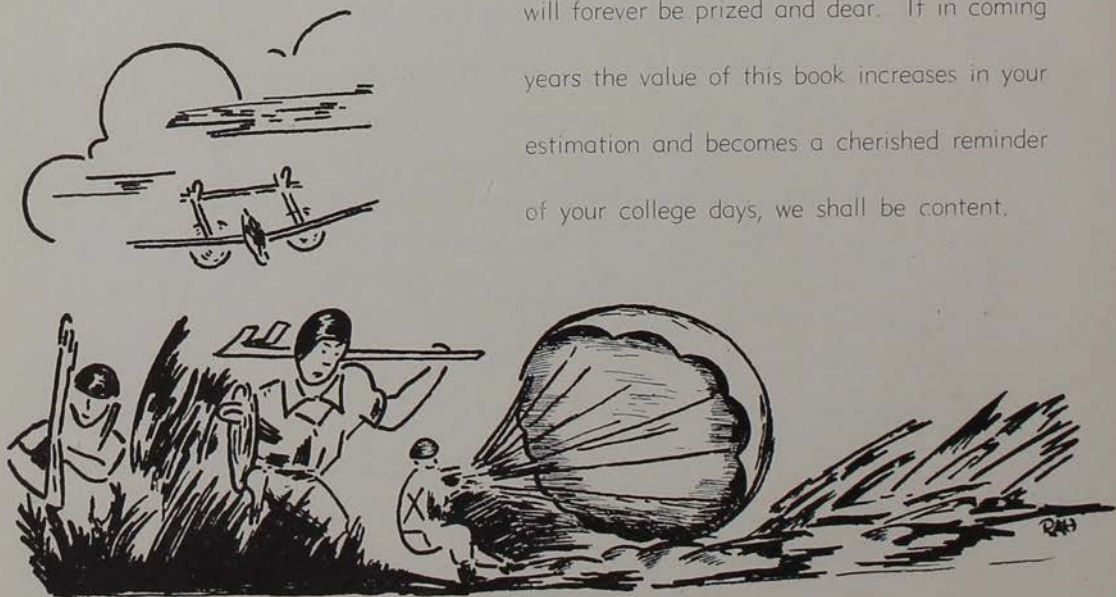

LIEUTENANT WALTER K. BRENNEMAN

"Brenny," a member of the graduating class of 1941, entered the Army Air Corps in December of the same year. He received his wings and commission as Second Lieutenant in June, 1942, became a pilot of a Flying Fortress, and received his First Lieutenant's Commission while on active duty in the Southwest Pacific Area. He was decorated with the Silver Star for Gallantry in Action last summer as co-pilot of a bomber which heavily damaged an enemy submarine at Rabaul. Later word came from the War Department that he has been missing since August 3, 1943.

**LIEUTENANT LESTER GILLAN**

Having attended I. C. C. during the years of 1938-1941, Lester enlisted in the Ground Forces of the Air Corps in September, 1941, and transferred to the Flying Cadets soon after Pearl Harbor. He received his wings and commission as Second Lieutenant in the autumn of 1942. Participating in the Tunisian, Sicilian, and African campaigns, he was promoted to the rank of First Lieutenant in October, 1943. He was awarded the Army Air Force Medal and the Silver Oak Leaf as well as several citations and campaign ribbons. On November 2, 1943, during the Italian campaign, he was reported missing in action.

**LIEUTENANT
DWIGHT McCROCKLIN**

Dwight attended Central from September, 1938, to May, 1941. On September 7, 1941, he enlisted in the Air Corps and graduated as a navigator from the training school at Hondo, Texas, in November, 1942. Commissioned as Second Lieutenant at the time of his graduation, he was promoted to the rank of First Lieutenant during the African campaign and later was transferred from a troop carrier squadron to a bomber crew. He also served in the Italian and Tunisian campaigns, and was awarded the Air Medal and Three Oak Leaf Clusters. Notification was received that he was listed as "missing in action" on September 3, 1943, while still in the Middle Eastern Area.

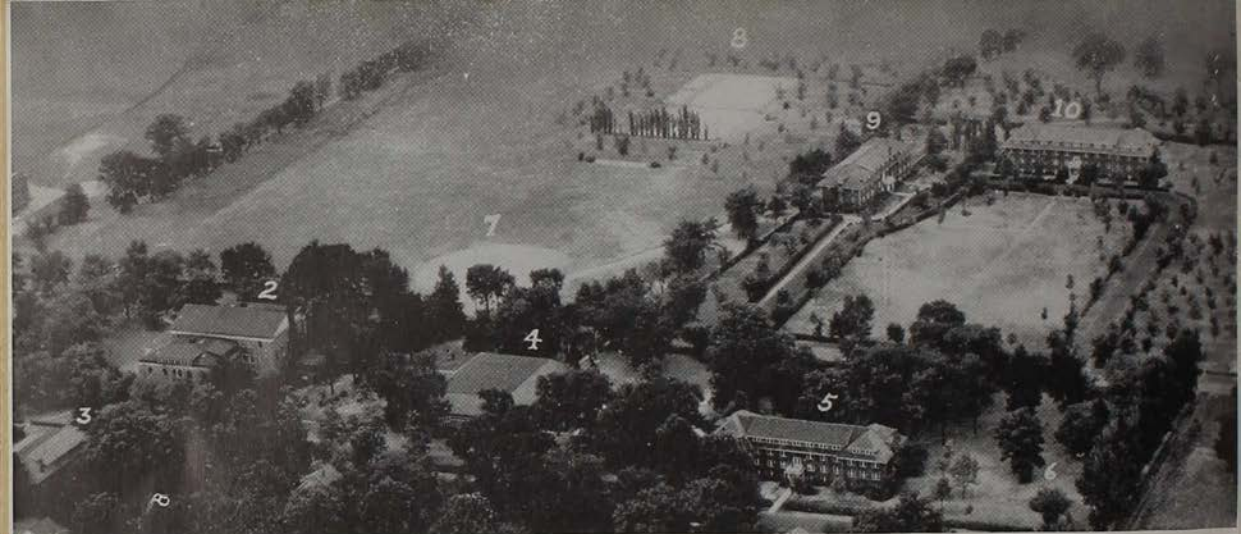

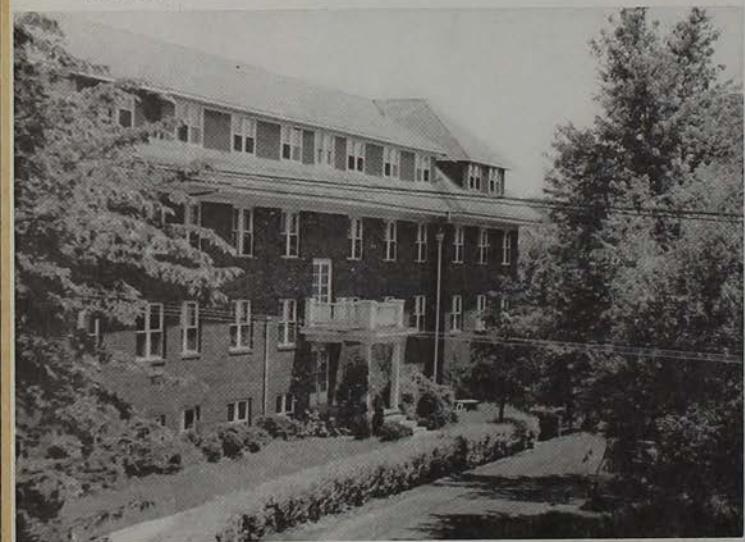

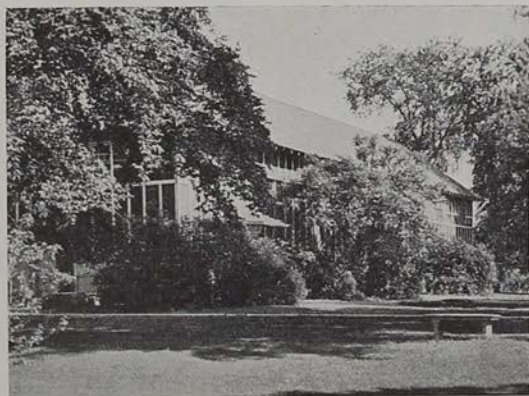


VIEW OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

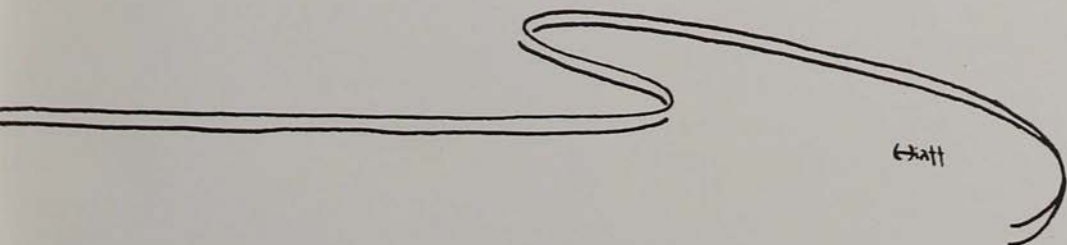

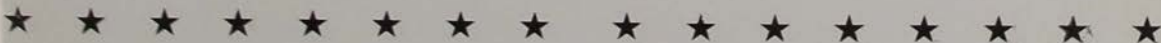

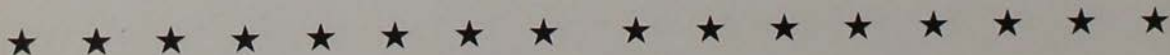

Victory Campaign

The consciousness that liberal and adequate financial support is necessary for the attainment of the objectives and goals of Indiana Central has been growing in the minds and hearts of the United Brethren in Indiana, Illinois, Wisconsin and Minnesota. A great forward step in college financing was taken in 1918 when \$250,000 was provided in a campaign for pledges which were paid during the five succeeding years. Additional funds were raised during the following years until the depression came in 1929.

Meanwhile, the campus acreage was increased from eight to fifty-eight acres; four dormitories, an observatory (a gift of Q. G. Noblitt), and a gymnasium were built, and the student body was increased from about fifty to as many as five hundred twenty-five. The faculty grew correspondingly and there were large additions made to laboratory and library facilities. At the same time public recognition of the college increased rapidly.

Having survived the dark decade—1930-1940—opportunity for enlargement was opened through the approval of the General Conference, in 1941, of a campaign which would complete the Ministerial Pension Fund and provide debt liquidation and endowment for the college. The Victory Campaign was organized and a goal of \$500,000 was set, of which approximately \$400,000 was to be for Indiana Central.

Under the guidance of Bishop Dennis, as chairman, and President Good, as general director of the campaign, a diligent corps of solicitors composed of Prof. James A. Weber (on leave from teaching), Sherman A. Cravens, Virgil J. Hague, R. M. Wolfe, Elmer Fowler, S. P. O'Reilley, M. P. Kindred, and E. L. Eckerley, secured cash and pledges for over \$400,000. The present field men, whom we are pleased to present herewith, have continued the solicitation until the total now exceeds \$430,000. The Ministerial Pension quota is paid. After all indebtedness is liquidated, approximately \$250,000 should be available for endowment. It is hoped and shall be planned to push this total to one million dollars within the next few years. This Victory Campaign is opening the way to a much greater service for Indiana Central College than ever before, and all of us are grateful to everyone who is helping to make its success possible.

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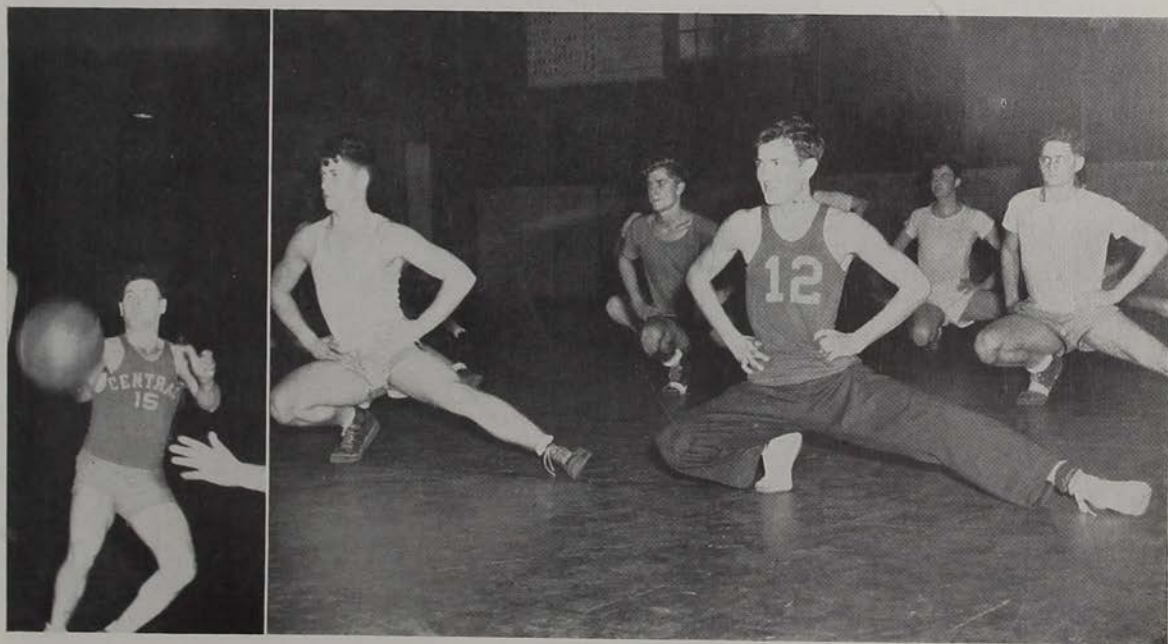
