
DEDICATION

A time to weep, and a time to laugh, a time to mourn, and a time to dance;


A time to cast away stones, and a time to gather stones together; a time to embrace, and a time to refrain from embracing;




A TIME TO WIN . . . .

This, however, was not the entire season. Although the team was handicapped by injuries, they managed to place third in the conference race and break even with a record of four wins and four losses.





# BASKETBALL


Winning the Hoosier College Conference and playing in two tourneys highlighted the 1948–49 basketball season for the Central Greyhounds. The climax of the season was the trip to Kansas City, Missouri, to participate in the National Association Intercollegiate Basketball tournament.


By winning nine out of ten conference games, the Greyhounds captured the Conference championship. The only loss was to Franklin College early iin the season,  $\alpha$  loss which was avenged by  $\alpha$  63-57 victory over the Grizzlies in February.


Although the Central team played the toughest schedule in many years, including such teams as Eastern Kentucky State, University of Kentucky, Butler, and Indiana State Teachers College, the Greyhounds found their mark after the first few games and rolled up a season record of sixteen wins out of twenty-three starts.

The first tourney of the season was held at Taylor University, December 9, 10, and 11. Central defeated Taylor and Ohio Northern, but was defeated in the final game by Manchester, 79-78. Thirty two colleges from all over the country were represented at the N.A.I.B. tournament in Kansas City. Indiana Central won its first game by defeating Connecticut State Teachers College; however, they were overcome in the second round by Hamline College of Minnesota, the tournament victors.

Awards of the season were announced at the Basketball Banquet, March 18. Dwight Swails, high point man of the season, was named the most valuable player. Norman Harner was elected captain of the team, and Woody McBride second high scorer, was named the player who had improved most in the season. Much credit is due Coach Nicosen, who snapped the team into shape for one of the best seasons in many years.

Coached by J. Louis Gehr, the Centralites deserve much credit for a fine season. The team elected Henry Martinez captain for the year.


