



The spotlight shines often on the sports scene. Through participation, one learns sportsmanship, cooperation, and physical fitness.



"C" Association is composed of athletes. Members sell programs and concessions at games, choose candidates for homecoming queen, and act as their escorts.





## APO



Coach Bill Bright's baseball team contributed the final round of athletics that virtually cinched the all-sports trophy for the year.







# Thinlies Take Title







The fourth game, at Manchester, brought a victory to even their conference record at 1—1. The Chicago Illini gave the Hounds a scare, but a fourth quarter touchdown gave Central a win.

Franklin was next, and Central was beaten by a single touchdown. Anderson, riding the conference lead with a 4—0 mark, was beaten by Central in front of a large Dad's Day crowd, by a 7—0 count. Hanover conquered the Greyhounds and left the field with a heart-breaking 7—6 victory.

The hard-working boys finished up their season against a tough Earlham team and were shut out for the first time of the year.




