


1-Much of the play is seen through the eyes of Tom, both as a character and as the narrator of his dreams. Here, his conflict with Amanda flares into argument out on the landing.



"Yes," said I, "IF YOU but help me UP!"



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Can a private university help lead America?

At Indiana Central University in Indianapolis we still believe in the future of independent education to keep America strong and to help each person realize his potential.

These <u>are</u> times of inflationary costs and a reassessment of educational priorities. Indiana Central University knows that, and has taken steps to assure the continued strength of the independent college system.

- I. We are still growing. For the second consecutive year, we have had the largest increase in enrollment of the 32 independent colleges and universities in Indiana. Statistical growth is not really our goal as a small independent institution, but we are glad so many new students have come to us.
- 2. Our Budget is in balance. From a general operating budget of less than 2 million dollars eight years ago, the 1976-77 operating budget is over \$6.25 million. We do not spend money we do not have and will balance this year's budget as we have for the past 30 consecutive years.
- 3. Costs remain relatively low. Tuition costs are among the more moderate of the independent colleges in the midwest.
- 4. Programs have expanded. We have added the M.A. and M.B.A. degrees in recent years.

New programs have been added in banking, health careers, criminal justice, legal assistantships, international/intercultural studies, and volunteerism. We are sensitive to changing needs!

- 5. No federal funds in buildings. We believe in the free enterprise system—have resisted government control—and have used no federal funds for facilities. Our new and modernized buildings, including the new library and learning resources center now under construction, are made possible by friends of the University and by individuals and foundations who believe in what is happening here!
- 6. We are reaching out. Not content to be simply situated at 1400 East Hanna Avenue to wait for students to come to us, we are reaching out through programs at the Mt. Zion Baptist Church for minority persons, volunteer training across the State in cooperation with the State of Indiana, management development programs in various business and industrial locations, banking programs in Pendleton, Edinburg, and at the Federal Reserve Bank, criminal justice programs at Pendleton Reformatory and the Youth. Center in Plainfield, and through the Consortium on Urban Education (CUE) for Indianapolis.

We think you deserve to hear the other side of the story! We strongly believe in the future of independent education to keep America strong and to offer our youth and adults the freedom of choice. Indiana Central expects to be here a long time and become stronger every year.
