WELCOME FRESHMEN



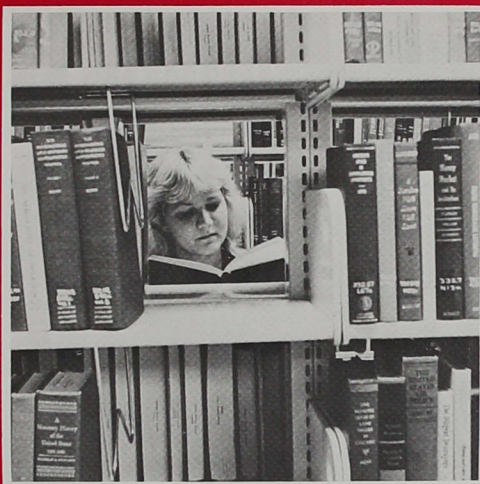

"Meet Me In The Library"



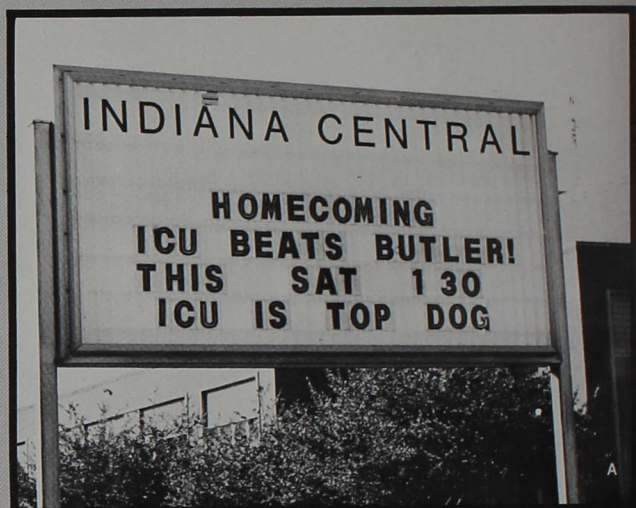


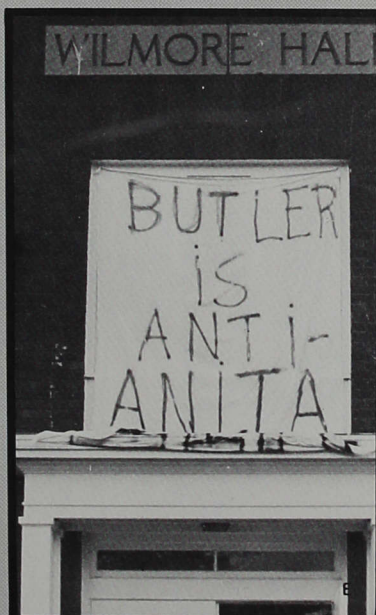

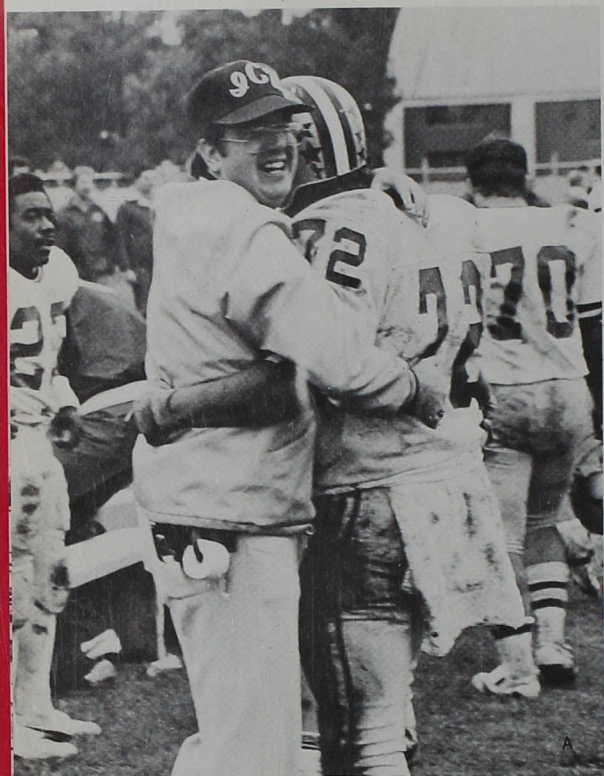
From the coach's standpoint, the 1977-78 football season was a disappointment. The 6-3-1 record was a poor indicator of the type of talent that was on the roster.

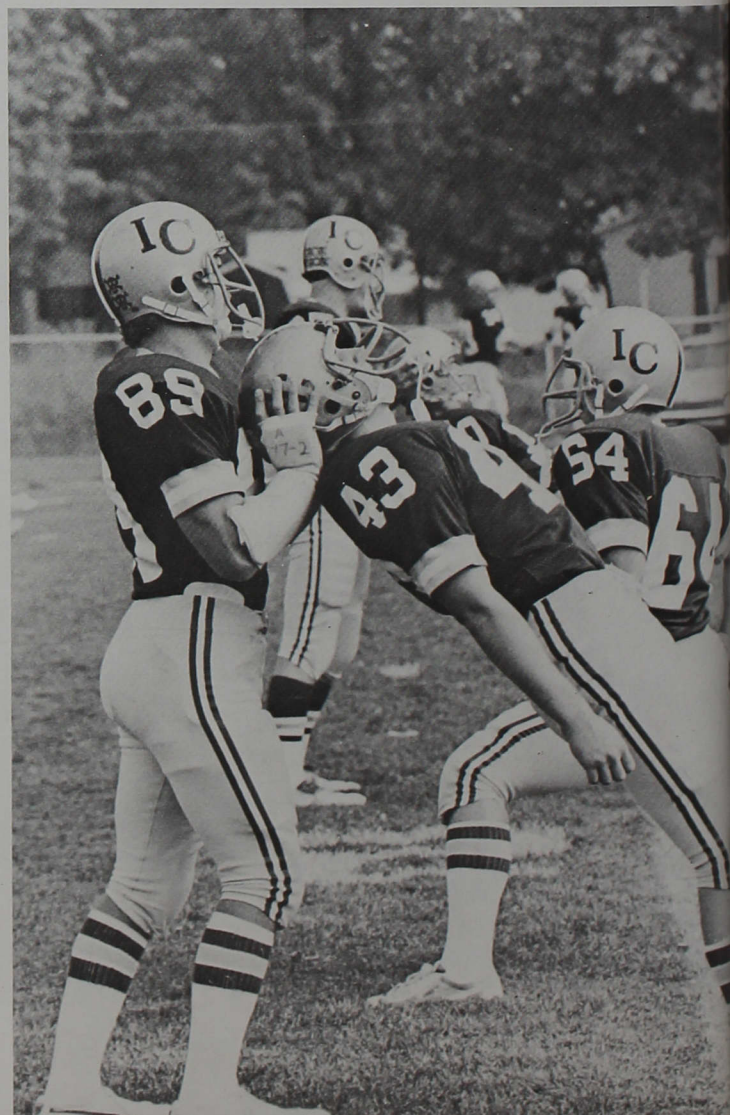
Seniors Karl Beer, a tight-end, and John Peters, a linebacker, were named All-Americans for their achievements on the playing field and in the classroom.

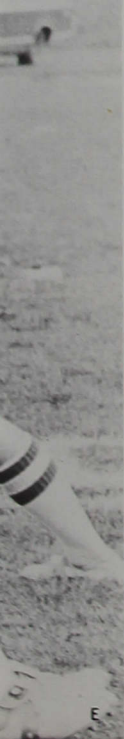
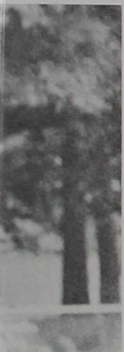

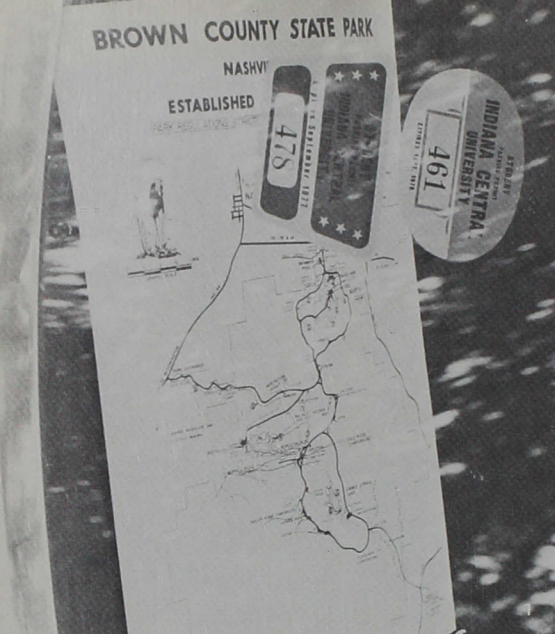

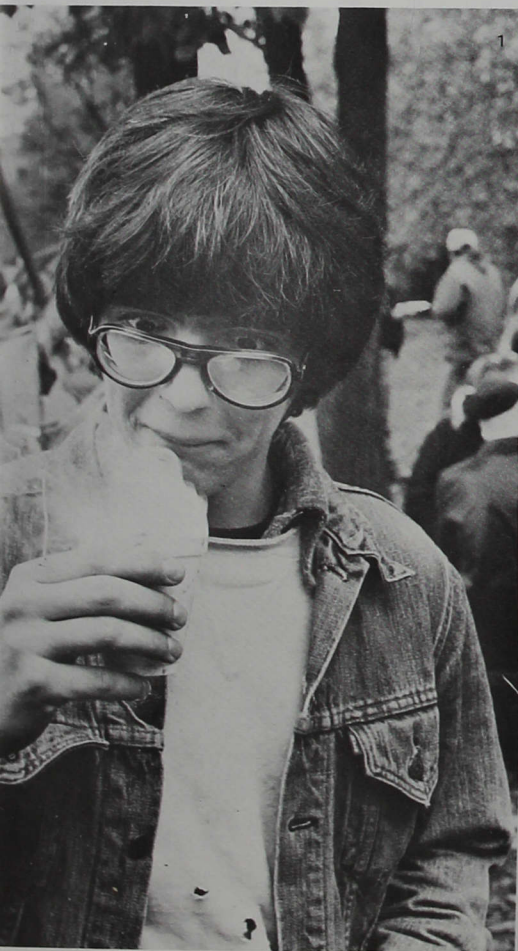

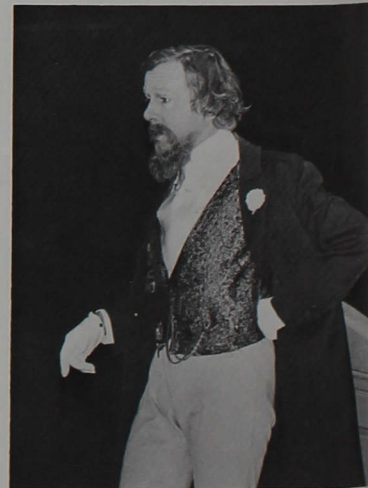
Indiana Central University's Theatre Department opened its 1977-78 season by presenting the touching play, *THE MIRACLE WORKER*, written by William Gibson. This moving play follows the struggles of a little girl, Helen Keller, who with help of a headstrong young Irish woman, Annie Sullivan, conquers two seemingly insurmountable obstacles — deafness and blindness. The play captures the picture of defeat and hopelessness felt by the Kellers prior to Helen's awakening. And equally well, it depicts the total ecstasy which envelopes Helen, her family, and most of all — her teacher, when she finally breaks the barriers and "sees" everything.

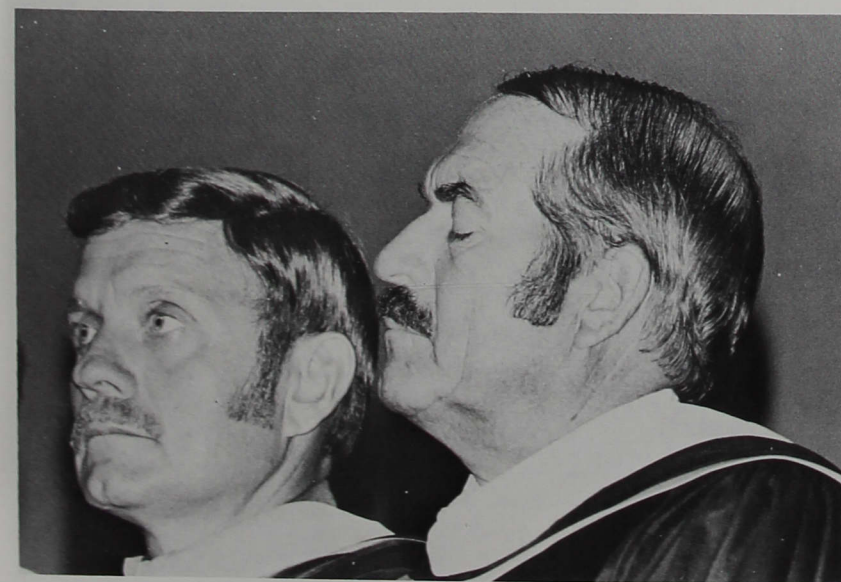
The cast, which was chosen last spring, returned to the campus early to begin rehearsals. It is not an easy thing to put together a full-length production and *Miracle Worker* was no exception. 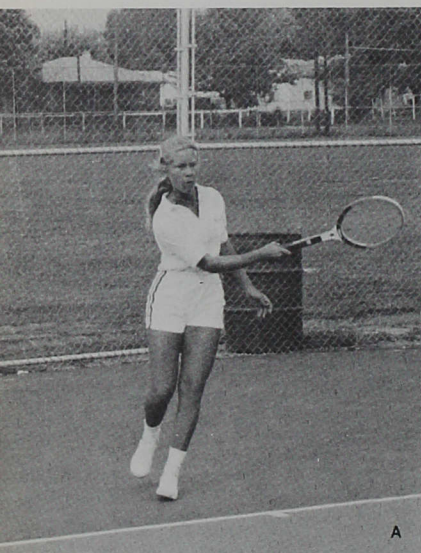

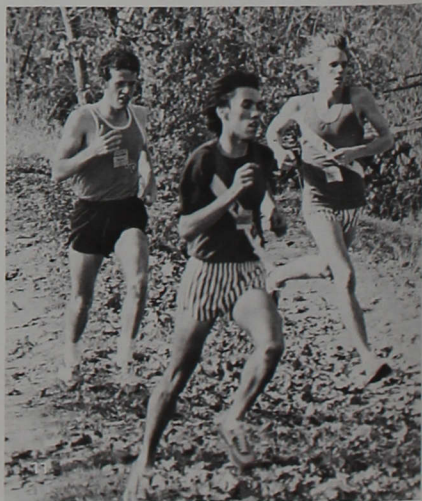

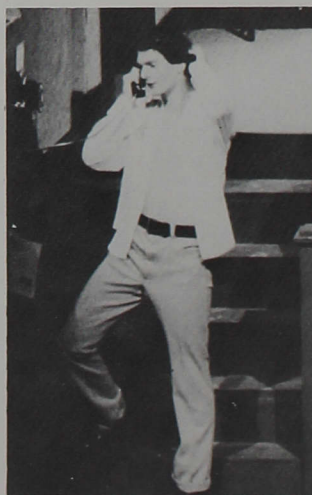
TEA & SYMPATHY NOV. 17, 18, 19

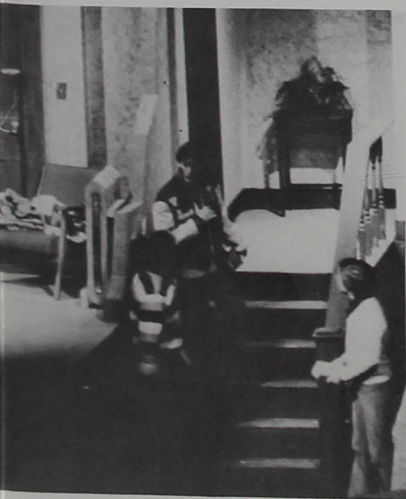
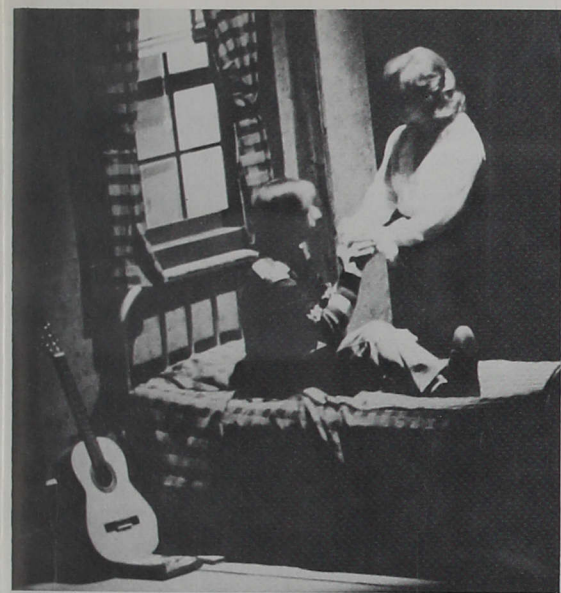


The Indiana Central Players presented Robert Anderson's moving drama, *TEA AND SYMPATHY*. Anderson deals with a subject of high controversy and relevancy to today's world. With emotional impact and power, Anderson explores the theme of manhood and homosexuality.

The play takes place in a New England prep school for boys. It is the story of a lonely and sensitive young man, named Tom Lee. Because of Tom's sensitivity and higher appreciation of the arts, he is falsely accused of having homosexual relations with one of the professors at school. One misunderstanding leads to another. Tom's father refuses to understand him and leaves Tom to fight alone, as does his roommate, Al. Frustrated and alone, Tom seeks out the only friend he has left — the housemaster's wife, Laura Reynolds. She is the only one who can see Tom for the truly sensitive, unique boy that he is.

Intertwining misunderstandings and emotions lead to Tom's attempt to prove himself with the local prostitute, where he miserably fails. His failure causes his attempted suicide. Jealousy of Tom by Mr. Reynolds leads to a division between Mr. Reynolds and Laura. The division culminates in the climactic scene where Laura confronts Mr. Reynolds with his own sexual incapacities. Bill Reynolds then becomes a victim of his own prejudices. Anderson powerfully gives us his definition of manhood in this turnabout climax. In the final scene, he puts that definition into practice as Laura gently and tenderly shows Tom just how much of a man he truly is.

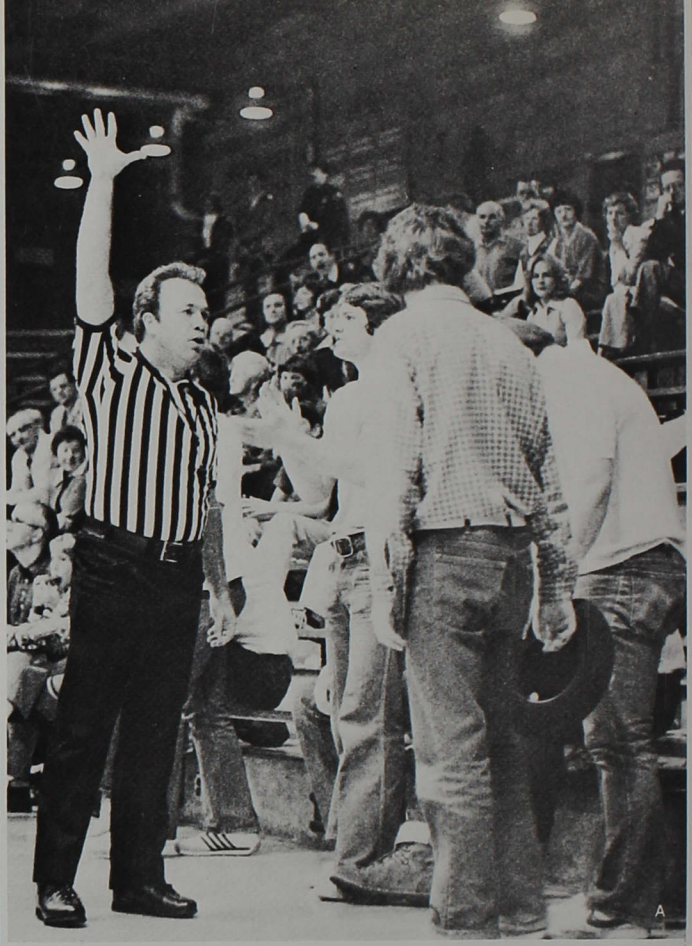

The Indiana Central Greyhounds started the 1977-78 season with their sights set high. First year coach, Bill Bright had a talented junior-loaded team. After eight straight wins in nine starts, the Hounds set an unprecedented school record by dropping ten straight games — the longest slump in the history of the school. The streak started with a 78-65 loss to DePauw University in the Indianapolis Classic here at Indiana Central University. The last loss in the slump was one with Butler University in a controversial finish at the Hounds home floor. The team finished the season with a 10-15 mark.

Despite the slump, there were some high points during the season. Junior, Kevin Pearson was named to the first All-ICC team and Junior, Dave Ancelet was named to the second. Pearson was also named to the All-District team on the second roster.

At the banquet on May 11, honoring winter sports, Pearson was named Most Valuable Player. Senior, Steve Kahl was named Captain, and sophomore, Jim Wernke was awarded the Kelso Reid Mental Attitude Award.

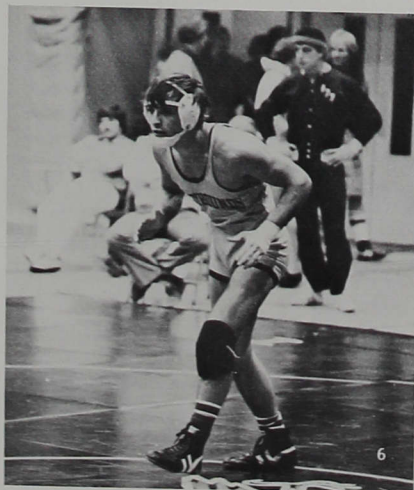
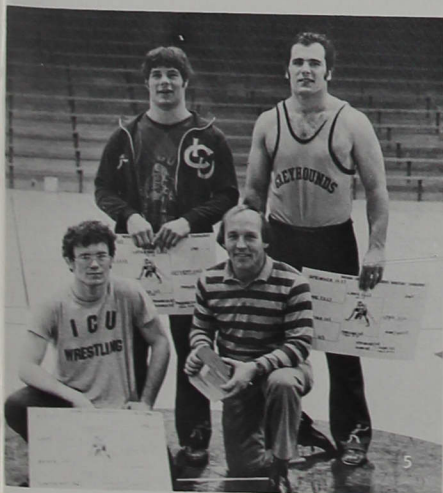
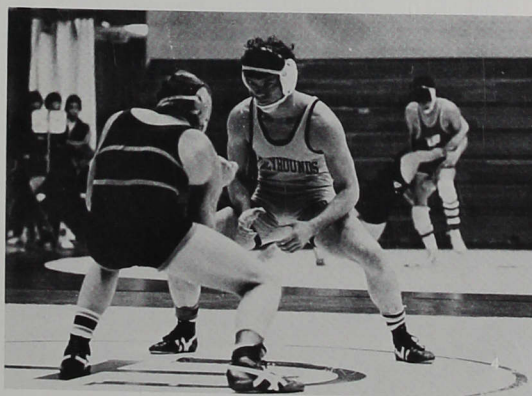
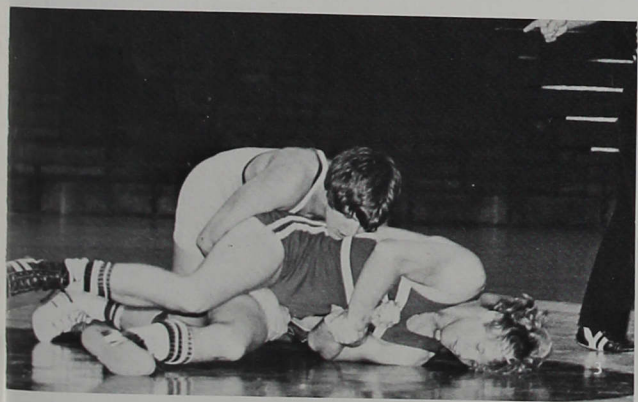
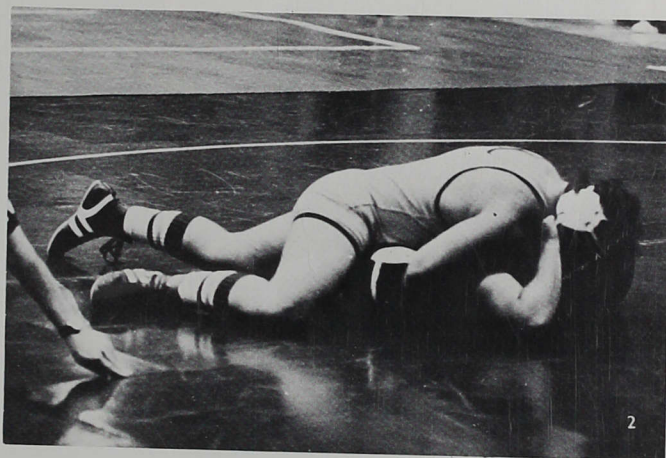
FOUR IN A ROW

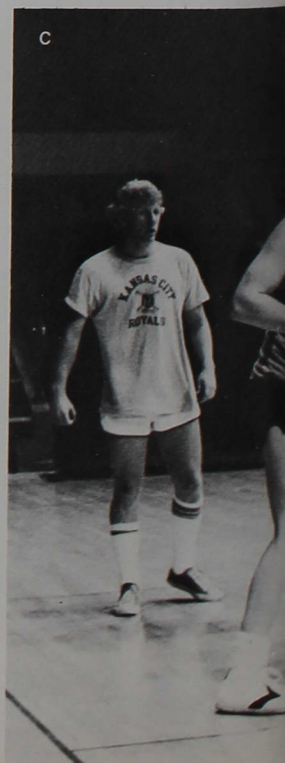




MEN'S INTRAMURAL BASKETBALL

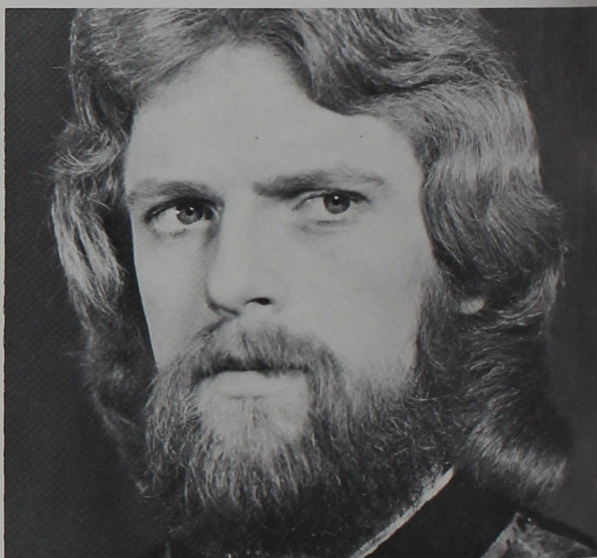

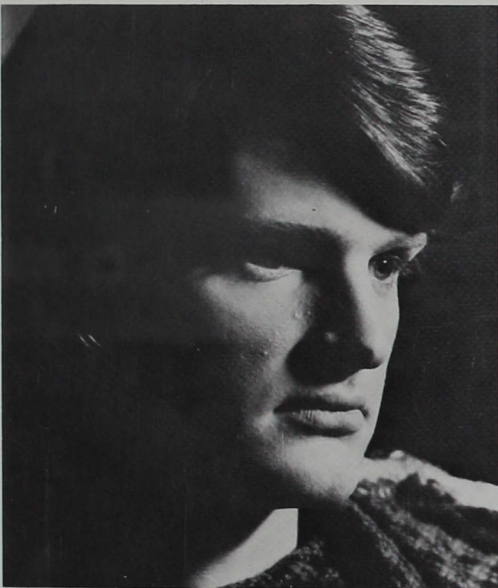

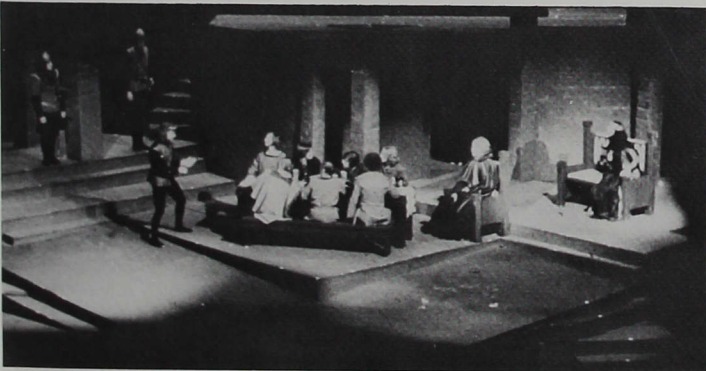
apparent. Dedication, perseverance, patience, hard labor — all the king becoming graces — combined for a royal production leaving the anticipation of more to come.

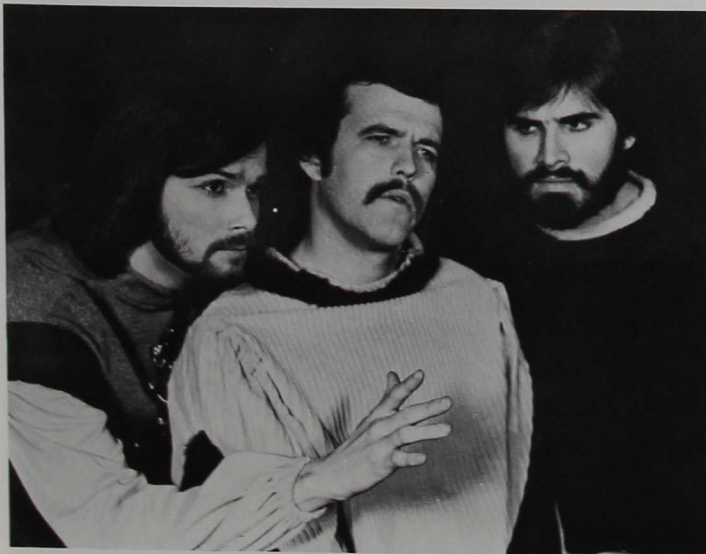

8:45 p.m. Travelers warned to "seek shelter immediately."

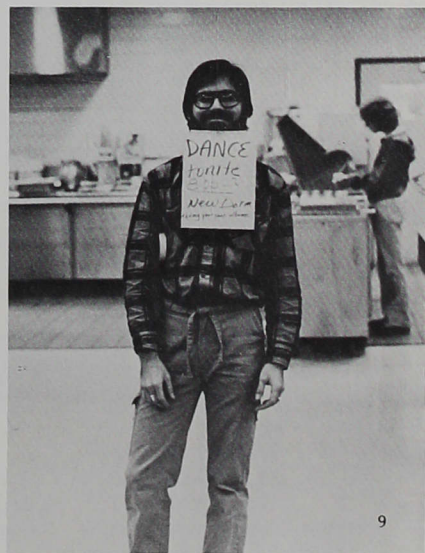
THURSDAY 2:12 a.m. Winds gusting to 55 m.p.h.

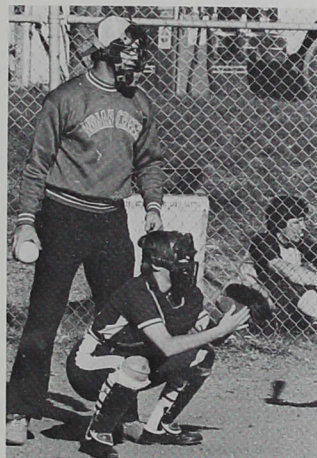

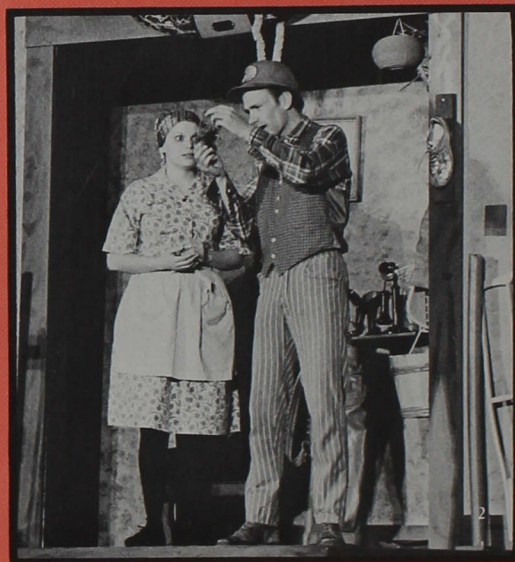
The script required such odd props as live boa constrictors, a printing press, and firecrackers (real ones!). Each day of production week, the student body took note of the new items that had been added to the set.

The story itself involved the "adventures" of the Sycamore family in New York in the 1930's. Each family member was a unique character. Grandpa, head of the household, was (according to a cast member) "the original hippie." Others included: Grandpa's daughter, Penny, who divided her time between writing plays, painting, and taking care of the family; Penny's husband Paul, and his friend Mr. DePinna (who came to deliver ice eight years ago and just stayed). 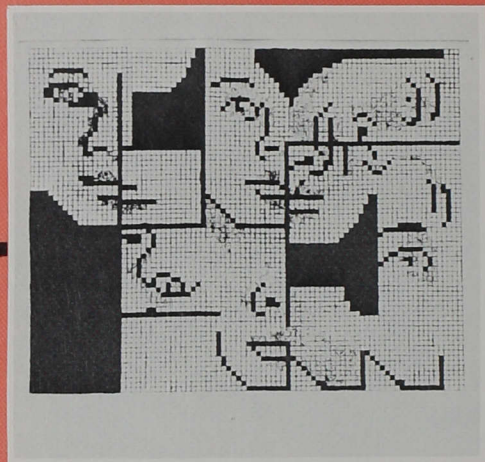


CONCERT CHOIR
