


More than blossoms opened Spring 1994 when the new Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center became the new home for the departments of Art and Music, leaving Good Hall to become the new home for several other departments and programs.

The U of I experience

Nestled on the southside of Indianapolis, the University of Indianapolis, or U of I as it is known to students, is home to approximately 3300 full time and part-time students. The campus is small, as are the classes, providing a more intimate learning environment.

In addition to classes, the university sponsors many activities for students. These include a variety of dances, picnics, competitions and the ever popular annual Brown County Day.

Four residence halls house the approximately 700 residential students. New Hall, North Hall and Warren Hall are all co-ed while Cravens Hall, which is also home to the nurse and counseling center, is reserved for female residents.

The university also has a fine sports facility in the Ruth Lilly Center and Nicoson Hall. The facilities feature an Olympic-sized swimming pool, an indoor track, two basketball courts and a dance studio, as well as offices for all of the athletic department, the sports information office, physical therapy and occupa-

tional therapy personnel.

The newly renovated Schwitzer Center is the home of the campus food services and the campus snack bar, Streets Corner. It also houses the bookstore, the game room and the Student Life and ISG offices.

Esch Hall, named in honor of former U of I President I. Lynd Esch, is where students attend English, business,

computer, theatre, philosophy and religion classes. The Information, Academic Services, Admissions, Business, Accounting, Financial Aid, Marketing and Media Relations, Development, Printing and Career Services offices are also in Esch Hall.



Lilly Hall houses the political sciences, behavioral sciences, math, science and nursing departments. With the addition of the Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center some of these departments are expected to move into Good Hall to rooms vacated by Art and Music.

Good Hall, the oldest building on the U of I campus, houses the foreign languages, social work, continuing education and the campus police. First semester, it was also home to the Music and Art departments, but they have expanded into the Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center.

Buxton Hall, a former dormitory, is where the Communications department is located. The campus radio station, WICR, *The Student Reflector*, *The Oracle* and the forensics team are all found in Buxton Hall. In addition, The Fine Arts Society of Indianapolis, which broadcasts over WICR, also has offices in Buxton.


The offices of the president, media services and the writing lab are all located in Krannert Memorial Library, which includes archives as well as the regularly library collection. The Library went on-line this year, with a computerized card catalogue.

U of I gets a facelift

Students returning to campus in the fall found many changes. The biggest changes were the growing Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center, the complete renovation of Schwitzer Center and the addition of a parking lot and drainage pond.

The Schwitzer concourse level was redone, giving the office of student life a larger space. A roomier bookstore was built and new mailboxes were added. This allowed students to each have his or her own box. Streets Corner also received a face lift. The floors were redone and windows were added to give it a more 'open' look. In addition, the floors were redone throughout the basement and new furniture was purchased for the concourse. The former bookstore was transformed into a game room which opened in the fall.

Upstairs larger side dining rooms were added. The President's Dining Room was moved into the former lobby. A new trustee meeting room was also built in previous lobby area. The Ober Dining Hall was shelled out and given a whole new look, including new lighting, a new serving area and a sun porch. A better handicap access ramp was installed to make the building completely handicap accessible.

In Nicoson Hall the gym floor was stripped and repainted with the new logo in the center. A new color scheme in the school colors was also done.

Behind the library a new parking lot was added to replace the one where the Fine Arts Center was being built. Next to North Hall a small pond was added to aid in draining the campus.


These renovations are part of a total campus renovation schedule, which will enhance campus appeal and make it more accessible.



These included the tug-o'-war, balloon toss and three-legged race.


Students also had the opportunity to hike trails, ride horses, play touch football and generally relax.

Each person in attendance received a commemorative Beavis and Butthead t-shirt with the dance theme design, *A Kiss To Build a Dream On*.









Unlike previous years the top dog trophy was no longer up for grabs. Butler made this clear before the game was ever played. Their reason for this was the

Convo brings new experiences to U of I

Convocation, a part of every Tuesday afternoon for U of I students, offered a variety of programs, both on and off campus, for general and performance credit.

Convocation provides the opportunity to attend programs of intellectual and/or cultural significance outside of the normal classroom setting. Among the events offered were music performances, lectures, demonstrations and theatre productions.


Full-time students attend convocation as a component of the liberal arts educational focus. Students earn 0.5 credit, for every two full semesters enrolled, by attending six general and six performance events for total of 12 events. Two convo credits are required to graduate.

Convocation has been the focus of debate among the faculty members and students. At this time, the convocation requirement is being examined and may be restructured.

Dr. Mary Beth Bagg, Modern Languages, served as convocation director, her second year, offering options such as field trips to the Eiteljorg Museum. A great deal of student input, thanks to surveys of the student body on what they would like to see or hear, was used. Even a Black Sect Tantric Buddhist spoke about the *I Ching* and an individual's *Ch'i*.

Christel Palace opens with a gala

Standing outside the west entry doors to the magnificent new Christel DeHaan Fine Arts Center, one could tell they had really rolled out the red carpet for the black-tie opening gala. (There wasn't actually any red carpet, but there were three red all-weather rugs in front of the doors and no one had wiped their feet on them yet.)

As I observed the remnants of yesterday's snowfall melting in the late evening sun, it occurred to me that despite the spell of bad weather and some minor problems with putting the finishing touches on the new \$10.2 million building, things had come together right on time.

"I guess they survived," said a woman waiting for her husband to finish his discussion with the valet parking attendants.

"Yes," I said. I was sure it had been a very stressful week for those in charge of making everything perfect for the evening.

"The pansies, I mean," the woman said, referring to the yellow potted flowers by the entrance that were apparently unharmed by Wednesday's snow.

"Yes," I said again. This was to be the climax of months, years, of hard work for many involved.

For the occasion, everything was top-class, beginning with the valet parking attendants, who collected guests' cars at the circular drive in

front of the building and dropped them off in the old Marsh parking lot. Meanwhile, for some reason, about a third of the parking spaces behind the library had been roped off, making it

Schaad, Gerald Boyce, Ed Manetta and Earl Snellenberger. On the tour, guests would see rooms that had been donated by Mr. and Mrs. William Bright, Dr. Mary Busch, Drs. Edwin and Jo Ann Domb, Dr. I. Lynd Esch, Mr. and Mrs. Donald Fisher, Dr. and Mrs. Frederick Hill, Mr. and Mrs. Kendall Hottell, Dr. and Mrs. David Huffman, Dr. and Mrs. George Keenan, Peter and Rebecca Wright Noot, Mr. and Mrs. David Sease, Gene E. Sease, and David Wantz and Susan Fleck Wantz. President Lantz, on behalf of the university, extended thanks and appreciation to Christel DeHaan for her \$3.5 million donation for the construction of the fine arts center. She emphasized her love for the arts, as well as the students and community the building would serve. That love, she said, is best expressed in the new fine arts center that she helped to create. She also returned the thanks to Lantz and others who had the vision to want to create the fine arts center. DeHaan said Lantz once told her he wanted "a place where the arts could not just be done, but celebrated."

At the performance by the Indianapolis Symphony Orchestra, I got to hear what I couldn't see earlier. The

Like President Lantz said, it was something we had been waiting for a long, long time. "I'm just happy to be here when we brought it all to fruition," Lantz said.

Seeing it brought to fruition made me a believer of the propaganda I'd been hearing about, like how, for its size, it had no rival in the Midwest—

sound during the approximately 90-minute performance that included music by Bach, Mozart, Holst and Boccherini was incredible. As the concert began, the motorized acoustic drapes raised to increase reverberation during the performance. The sounds of the orchestra were enhanced by the 28-inch thick walls and special reflecting chandeliers that enable musicians to better perform with proper balance and intonation. The hall was designed around the center of the stage and every detail, down to the thickness of seat cushions, is intended to maximize acoustical performance. As magnificent as the performance hall are the nine-foot grand pianos to be housed here: a rear Hamburg Steinway and a Bosendorfer.

Perhaps the greatest thing about the Christel DeHaan Fine Arts center could not be heard or seen that night. The opening gala demonstrated one of the greatest gifts the new building will bring to campus life— increased interaction with the community that will come from events like this and others.







does for us. The meetings and fellowship also gave students support when problems pulled them down. FCA also had retreats and took part in activities around school.







For the second time in eight years the original musical production, One Voice, was preformed at U of I. This musical was written by Dr. Williams and his daughter Kathryn Williams Ransburg.

The dinner theatre revival ran April 15, 16 and 17 in Schwitzer Center's Ober dining Hall. The buffet dinner began each evening at 6:30 p.m., followed by performances at 8 p.m.

The captivating Biblical drama combines serious thought with humor in a story that begins with the Creation and continues through the resurrection of Jesus and beyond.

Characters such as Adam and Eve, Moses, the Egyptian Pharaoh Daughter are portrayed against a musical backdrop that includes rock, gospel, country and burlesque.

"The play's intent is to show God's love for mankind and the unlikely people he used to present his message and witness to God's glory," Williams said.

The play had its world premiere on the U of I campus in 1986. Later Williams was invited to perform the work at the Theatre Ten Ten in New York for a three week showcase.

Williams wrote the script and his daughter, Kathryn Williams Ransburg, composed most of the music and lyrics. Other collaborators were Susan Day Hancock, Paul Timothy Jackson, Daniel A. Johnson and Michael F. Schoppenhorst. Sue Ellen Conway provided additional music and lyrics.

James W. Ream serves as technical and designer. He recreated the set he did for the New York production. Steve Enzinger, U of I voice instructor, is musical director. James Cramer of the Indianapolis Ballet is choreographer.

Dr. Richard Williams retired after 26 years of service at U of I. Williams headed the theatre department.


When he joined the faculty, the department was a combination of speech and theatre. Then, only one theatre course was offered and the department did two productions per year. Now a full theatre curriculum and a theatre major are offered and the number of annual productions has doubled.

Dr. Williams was appointed speech and theatre department chairman in 1972. When the departments separated, he continued as theatre chairman.

Williams boasts an impressive resumé of accomplishments with the theatre department. The production of *Hamlet*, done in his third year at the university, brought Shakespeare back to the Indianapolis stage after a 25 year absence. In addition, the cast traveled to Great Britain to perform.

Williams also developed a "ministry to drama" program. The plays were not always of a religious nature, but many of them were performed in churches. The cast would tour the country to perform. Churches would host potluck dinners for them and they would stay in the homes of church members.

The event that Williams is most proud of in his theatre tenure at the university is having the opportunity to perform *One Voice* at the *Theatre Ten Ten* in New York City. The play was written by Williams and some former students. The music was written by his daughter, Kathryn Williams Ransburg. The world premier was on the university campus in 1986. The production was taken to Canada and the east coast. From there, Williams was invited to bring the show to New York for a three week showcase the following year.






bright spot was kick returner Mike Gillock who led the conference with over 26 yards per return. Defensively




Women's Tennis earns Great Lakes Valley Conference title





Mens Basketball sets its best GLVC record ever (10-8)

The U of I men's basketball team finished the 1993-94 season breaking two school records. The team finished with its best GLVC record ever (10-8) and most GLVC wins in a season. The team finished the conference season with a fifth place finish in the GLVC. Coach Royce Waltman's 'Hounds finished the season with an overall record of 17-10, the most wins for a U of I team since 1971.

Leading the way individually for the 'Hounds was sophomore Perrell Lucas who led the team with 17.4 points per game and earned second team All-GLVC honors. Sophomore guard Noi Chay earned All-GLVC honorable mention by finishing second in points per games on the team with 13.3. Chay also shot 42 percent on the season from behind the three-

point line, while Lucas shot 46 percent from behind the three-point arc. Sophomore forward Michael Brooks shot a blistering 51 percent from long distance to help lead to a 10.3 scoring average. Senior center Jim Mosher chipped in 11.8 points per game and led the team with 5.8 rebounds per game. Sophomore Kyle Shirk, a transfer from Winthrop University in South Carolina, poured in 9.8 points per game and 5.1 rebounds a game. Freshman center David Weise shot 59 percent from the field enroute to 8.3 points per game and 5.1 boards a game. Also finishing with a good season was senior co-captain

Shannon Arthur with 4.5 boards a game to go along with 6.2 points a night.





The Lady Greyhounds also put up impressive numbers in the




Ann Hensley looks for an open receiver for her pass.

all three events.



The total of five competitors at Nationals for the Lady Greyhounds was a record for the team. Also helping the team effort for the season





Polar Bear Run







Men's Tennis team wins 4th straight GLVC conference title

Coach Joe Gentry's men's tennis team had another excellent season becoming only the second U of I team in the 16 year history of the GLVC to win four straight conference titles. The only other team with that accomplishment was the 1987-92 men's golf team. The team finished the season with a record of 11-12 and were 7-1 in the Great Lakes Valley Conference. The outstanding season led to the naming of Gentry as GLVC Coach of the Year for the fourth consecutive year.

Individually the team was led by senior co-captain Perry Mann at #1 singles and #1 doubles with partner Steve Klei, Mann had an overall record on the season of 31-25. 



A force in establishing the University of Indianapolis Athletic Hall of Fame, Bright also served on the NCAA II Basketball Committee as chair of the Great Lakes Region committee. In that role, Bright helped select teams for the NCAA Tournament and the Division II top 20.

Bright, who still holds nine school records based on his outstanding baseball pitching, excelled in both baseball and basketball as an undergraduate. In 1952, he was 8-0 with a 1.24 ERA in leading the Greyhounds to a perfect 13-0 season. In 1953, Bright set school records with 10 victories, 10 complete games, 148 strikeouts and $92\frac{2}{3}$ innings pitched. In his three seasons, Bright finished with Greyhound records for winning percentage (22-3, .880), ERA (1.46) and strikeouts (317). An Amateur Baseball All-American, Bright pitched in the Philadelphia Phillies farm system prior to returning to Indianapolis. In basketball, Bright earned three letters along with second-team All-ICC honors.

While Bright is beginning his bridge to retirement, he will serve as compliance coordinator for NCAA eligibility in the 1994-95 school year and assist Dave Huffman.

David Huffman, who replaces Bright, is a 1964 cum laude graduate



of U of I and earned varsity letters in basketball and baseball. He also played on conference championship teams in both sports. As a senior, he played on the Greyhounds' 26-3 basketball team.

He has been Dean of Student Affairs at U of I for 16 years and oversees Admissions, Student Life, Career Services, Chaplain, Cooperative Education, Health Service (medical and counseling), Safety and Police Services, and Student Development and Retention Services. Prior to that, he was in the University Admissions office, from 1970-84, as Director of Admissions.

Huffman earned a master's degree in counseling and guidance from Butler in 1969, and his Ed.D. from Indiana University in administration of higher education in 1978.

Coach **Mark Peterson**, after five seasons and a .478 record (99-108), stepped down as university baseball coach. Peterson noted that 16 of the losses were to Division I schools. Purdue and Indiana were both beaten on their home fields by U of I baseball teams.


For two of Peterson's seasons the teams were nationally ranked among the top 25 in the country. Pitcher Jeff Montfort this year led the nation in strikeouts and received an NCAA award for this feat. Jeff, a senior, is just one of several outstanding players coached by Peterson.

Joe Polizzi, an assistant coach at Hillsdale College, Michigan, was selected the 13th head coach in the 70 years of Greyhound football.

Polizzi came to U of I after a seven year stint at Hillsdale, his alma mater. A former Hillsdale player, he coordinated the Charger offense and offensive line the past two seasons and served as defensive backfield coach from 1987-91.

Polizzi has also been the Charger's baseball coach. A native of Monroe, Michigan, Polizzi also have coached at Ferris State, 1986-87, and at Ball State, from 1984-85.

Linebacker Polizzi has a B.A. from Hillsdale in Communications Arts and Sciences and a master's in the same field from Western Michigan.
